SALFORD HUNDRED

In 1976 when the Salford pub surveys began there were 100 real ale pubs in the city. 40 of those pubs have since been closed and all but 6 of those 40 demolished. Rebuilds, new pubs and conversions have left the city with 71 real ale pubs. In that time Greenalls have lost 12 and Wilsons 14 pubs. Other brewers have suffered less. The two Holts pubs to have been demolished (Broadway, Waggon & Horses) have been rebuilt and all 13 of their Salford pubs seem to be successful, including the Kings Head which they bought from Wilsons. The King Billy on Springfield Lane, which closed as a Marstons pub, seems to be thriving as a free house. With the exception of the ill-fated Gloucester, free houses have succeeded where many other pubs have failed. The Mark Addy, the Albert Park, the Angel, the Wallness and

the King Billy all have a greater will to succeed than many of the tied houses against which they are competing.

WHAT'S DOING

YATES & JACKSONS SWALLOWED

The fact that the North West avoided many of the brewery takeovers of the post-war years and ended up with more independent breweries than any other area is usually put down to guts and determination. Perhaps we're just slow. Recently Boddingtons have taken over Oldham Brewery and Hartleys has been acquired by Robinsons. News that Thwaites of Blackburn have acquired the 40 houses of Yates & Jácksons is another nail in the coffin of independent North West breweries. How safe from takeover are Jennings, Mitchells, Burtonwood, Hydes and - God forbid - Holts? Thwaites will not be using Y & J's brewery but this will be sold to Mitchells, whose own brewery in Lancaster's city centre may eventually close.

Yates & Jacksons bitter is now on sale at the Marble Arch, Rochdale Road, Manchester, until the death (sometime in January). On 12th January John Worthington, mine host at the Marble Arch, is running his bus, an ex-LUT Guy Arab Mk5, to Lancaster for a Yates & Jacksons wake. The object of the exercise is to pay last respects in as many Y & J pubs in the city (lunchtime and evening) as possible. Mourning dress is compulsory. The bus will be picking up along the A6, and all wishing to make the trip should contact John at the Marble Arch. In the event of the bus being fully booked, a duplicate will be called into service (ex-Bury Corporation Leyland Titan PD3/6).

PUB PRESERVATION

CAMRA's Pub Preservation Group will be presenting a Pub Preservation Award to the Boars Head (Peter Walker), Leigh, on Tuesday 4th December at 1.00pm. Local CAMRA branch members are invited.

PLASMA'S

The Roundtree Restaurant Group are planning to turn the old Central Blood Bank, Roby Street, Manchester, into a licensed residential hotel.

R.I.P.

The Grafton Arms, Grafton Street, Chorlton-on-Medlock, which has been an institution among students, hospital workers and general boozers alike, is to be demolished around Christmas time. This Good Beer Guide Holts pub is in a poor state of repair and is to be replaced by a new pub on the same site. The latter is expected to be completed by next November.

HARTLEY MATTERS

A very pleasant change of ale from that in the "Real Ale in Rochdale" list was found on a recent campaigning tour - Duttons has been replaced in the Ship Inn, Milnrow Road, by Hartleys XB (on handpump). It's good to see at least one Whitbread pub still selling Hartleys.

OH WELL

The newest pub in Wigan is the Orwell, named after guess who, on Wigan Pier. Tetley bitter and mild are on sale, both at 70p (36p for a gill!) It's a bit hard to swallow, maybe, but any new pub that opens in the dry-as-dust Wallgate area is welcome.

SHIPSHAPE


The Ship Hotel, Millgate, Wigan, re-opened on Thursday 8th November as "Raffles". Don't let the name put you off - it's **not** a horrible "fun pub". Burtonwood have spent a lot of money on restoring the magnificent wood and glass panelling around the bar and walls, so this five Victorian pub is looking even more splendid than before. All interior changes seem sensible and in keeping with the original fittings - how long is it since we said that about a brewer? Almonds bitter, Burtonwood mild and (if you can find the handpumps hidden at the bottom end) Tetley bitter, Youngers IPA and Number 3 are available.

Another Burtonwood pub recently reopened in Wigan is the Royal Oak, but, sad to report, keg beer is served through handpumps.

The Globe, Regent Road, Salford, which is now getting the "Almonds" treatment, is expected to open before Christmas.

ASHTON ALE

The manager of the Station (free house), Warrington Street, Ashton-under-Lyne, is moving to take up the tenancy of the Caledonian (Robinsons), also in Warrington Street. Handpumps are expected to replace the electric pumps in January.

TADDY BITTER

The Windmill at Carrington has had Tadcaster bitter for the last couple of months but is still awaiting the re-appearance of real mild. We await developments with bated breath and taste buds.

OUTLOOK MILD

In an interesting reversal of the usual theme, a bitter has been withdrawn due to poor sales to make way for a mild. Bass 4X dark mild on handpump has replaced Tower cask bitter at the Commercial in Springhead; sales are encouraging.

Elsewhere in the Saddleworth area, cask Bass beers are expected at the Grotton. New landlord Gerry Matley, formerly at the Cloggers in Uppermill, has already started changing the Grotton to his style of things. Watch this space.

RIVAL ARCH

Planning permission has been sought by Direct Design and Build to convert the existing arches under Victoria Street into an export showroom, public house and restaurant. Perhaps very shortly Mark Addy customers will not be the only ones who can watch cardboard boxes and dead rats float past them as they drink on the edge of the Irwell.

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OLD TOM ARRIVES

The Gardeners Arms, Mill Bottom, Waterhead, Oldham, is under new tenancy. Draught beers are still handpumped, with Old Tom on gravity.

DISLODGED

Yates Wine Lodge on Bradshawgate in Bolton has been given the full posh treatment. Surprisingly, this has included the removal of the cask Thwaites and Wilsons. Have Yates really got the market weighed up?

SHARPENING THE AXE

Pub refurbishments from Wilsons continue apace. The Axe and Cleaver at Dunham and the Wheatsheaf in Altrincham have both recently reopened after the Pennine Host (Chef & Brewer division) treatment. Both pubs are an improvement and both are done in similar style - opened up whilst still retaining separate drinking areas; plenty of real wood, not the plastic variety. The Axe continues to serve both bitter and mild on handpumps in good form, although the Wheatsheaf has converted the mild back to fizz. Both pubs cater to the young trade and tend to be noisy, particularly from far-too-loud juke boxes.

PSST! WANNA BUY A PUB?

when it comes to ways of getting rid of their tied estate in Manchester, Wilsons take the biscuit. Their imaginative ways of decimating their pubs have included swapping them with Burtonwood, Greenalls and John Smiths, selling them into the free trade, letting the council knock them down, boarding them up and allowing them to fall down. The latest bazzing wheeze is to sell them to Banks's. The four pubs to go are:

Gransmoor, Ashton Old Road, Openshaw Gorton Brook, Clowes Street, West Gorton Mitchell Arms, Beswick Street, Ancoats Osborne House, Rochdale Road, Collyhurst

If Banks's, Burtonwood, John Worthington and even Greenalls and John Smiths can make a go of them, why can't Wilsons? Have they asked themselves that question and, if so, what's the answer?

THE YACHT SUNK

The rebuilt Yates's Wine Lodge at the top of Oldham Street (formerly affectionately known as the Yacht Club) reopened at the end of October. Alas, the last true Yates's in Manchester has been completely ruined. This former Mecca for drunks and ladies of the night has become a sort of licensed Macdonalds. Holts bitter is served through electric pumps at 70p a pint - 30% more expensive than a Holts managed house and less than one mile from their brewery. Gone are the days when you could get legless for a fiver and still have enough change for a woman!

MORE ROPE

A new ground floor kitchen is being built at the Rope and Anchor, Dunham Massey. It is hoped that this will be completed by the end of the year so that catering facilities will be much improved for the future.

NO GROUSE HERE

The Grouse Inn, Lees Road, Oldham, a former Bass house, reopened as a free house during November. There was an introductory offer of Matthew Brown's cask mild and bitter at 50p a pint, alongside the remaining fizzy Bass offerings.

BIGGER VIC

Refurbishment and extension into the adjacent off licence at the Victoria (Hydes), Withington, is almost complete and an official reopening is scheduled for 17th December. Members of the Halle and Philharmonic orchestras will be in attendance, providing musical entertainment.

HORTON IMPROVED

At last Lees Brewery have mastered the art of tastefully extending a pub. The Horton Arms, Streetbridge Road, Chadderton, joins the nearby Greyhound in Royton in showing how pubs can be extended and refurbished whilst retaining their essential character. In recent years, the brewery have had a less than impressive record on pub alterations. The large open-plan lounge, devoid of nooks and crannies and with over-bright lighting, seemed to be the order of the day. Certainly the Horton has bucked the trend and is well worth a visit. The mild and bitter (53p and 55p) are still handpumped and now draught Moonraker is available through an electric pump.
