

HALF MOON SHINES ON

Things are progressing well for Tyldesley's newest pub, the Half Moon Inn on Elliot Street. Licensee and CAMRA member David Rowlinson (left) reports a steady increase in barrelage, with Boddingtons bitter the favourite. Oldham bitter (the real stuff) is catching on and there is a growing demand for Boddingtons mild. Marstons Pedigree is the current guest beer, and this will be replaced by Taylors Landlord in January.

WHAT'S DOING

NEW EYRIE?

It is now unlikely that the Spread Eagle (Holts) on Regent Road, Salford, will be rebuilt on an adjacent site, as was the original intention. Instead, Salford Council have made land available in Little Hulton for a new public house. (The other two remaining pubs on that stretch of Regent Road — the Wellington (Boddingtons) and the Live and Let Live (Wilsons) — are also to be demolished in the near future; Boddingtons will be rebuilding behind the present site.) Holts have made a provisional application to build their new pub at the top of Cleggs Lane close to the bridge across the M61.

WHITBREAD "REAL" LAGER

MORE HEROES

Another branch of the enterprising real ale off-licence chain of Legendary Lancashire Heroes has opened at Bowfell Road, Urmston, near the Curzon Cinema. There is a choice of no less than 6 real ales at all times and up to 30 different throughout the year. The shop is also a further outlet for What's Doing and 1985 Good Beer Guides.

ANGEL ALE

The Angel (Greenall Whitley), Wellington Street, Gorton, has a very keen licensee dedicated to real ale. Handpumps have been installed to serve the well-kept traditional bitter. A large sign at the bar advertises "Real Ale" and the licensee would like to see a similar and bigger sign outside the pub. A sensible approach - please take note, Greenalls!

HANDPUMPS

The Britannia and the Assheton Arms (both Lees) in Middleton town centre have had handpumps installed to replace the pillar-type pumps common in many Lees outlets.

TOP JOB

Ewart Boddington, Executive Chairman of Boddingtons Breweries, has been elected Chairman of the Brewers! Society. He joined the family firm in 1947, aged 20, as a junior brewer. He succeeded his father, the late Geoffrey Boddington, as Head Brewer in 1953 and became a director in that year. In he became Joint Managing Director with his cousin Boddington, and became Chairman in .1970 when Geoffrey Boddington retired to become President.

WILSONS CHANGES

Pennine Hosts have recently handed back five of their pubs to Wilsons, to the dismay of red light bulb manufacturers and plastic edelweiss and orchid cultivators. Four are in Greater Manchester: Ducie Bridge, Miller Street, Manchester; Crown & Kettle, Great Ancoats Street, Welcome, Pitts, Oldham; Robert Tinker, Collyhurst.

The Grenadier, Oldham Street, has been sold to J W Lees and the Falcon on Dryden Street (near the Plymouth Grove Hotel), the last of the batch sold to Banks's, was the first to open under new ownership last month. The Dancing Weasel, Great Ancoats Street, is still looking for a buyer.

WHITBREAD IN BURY CENTRE

Sadly the George Hotel has dispensed with its Castle Eden and cask Trophy, so reverting to a keg-only pub. The Trophy, of course, was sold alongside the keg version and no choice offered. Across the road, the Knowsley retains both ales, although in variable condition. This is now a "Light and Sound" pub after receiving its initial transformation in 1983 and has to be seen to be believed! Nearby, the Rayners Bar remains obstinately keg-only, whilst nearer the Parish Church the White Lion, although still selling Duttons bitter, has been doing so through an unmarked handpump for months.

PROTECTION

Manchester's new rapid transit system (trams) may mean the death of the Britons Protection, which seems to be in the way. Strange how it managed to survive 80 years of proper trams some years ago.

WINDMILL CHANGE

Stand by for yet another licensee at the Windmill, Pendlebury (where Sam Smiths new bitter sells for 59p a pint). The present incumbent leaves to take over the Bispham Hotel, Blackpool, in January.

BOLTON CHANGES

The Old Three Crowns, Deansgate, has had the Pennine Host treatment. The theme here is "The English Alehouse", which has involved ridding the pub of its carpets and open fire. The floors are now just wooden boards and the comfortable seating has been replaced by bare wooden stools and chairs. A 12-foot extension has been built at the back and the pub has a less congested look about it. Unfortunately the traditional mild has gone, but Wilsons Original bitter is still on handpumps - at 70p a pint.

Further up Deansgate, at the Junction with Marsden Road, the Gipsy's Tent has become Winston's free house. Extensive renovations have turned this three-roomed pub into what looks like an open-plan luxury bedroom. However, real ale remains at this ex-Tetley house in the shape of handpumped Boddingtons and Stones bitter.

Greenalls Original is now on sale at the Crofters Hotel, St George's Road, but has disappeared from the Queen Elizabeth, Fletcher Street.

PICCADILLY NEWS?

The Black Horse (Robinsons) on Manchester Road, Oldham (opposite Werneth Fire Station), has been taken over by Oliver Parkinson and his brother John (the overnight news reader on Piccadilly Radio). This formerly dingy pub has recently been liberated from a compulsory purchase order relating to some long-forgotten road scheme. After closing the doors for 10 days to remove the grime of 20 years or more this multi-roomed pub appears to be back to something like its former glory. The Best Bitter and Mild are in excellent nick and Old Tom (gravity) was due last month.

LESS REAL ALE IN NORTH MANCHESTER

1984 showed a decline in the number of real ale outlets in North Manchester and Salford. There were 11 real ale gains (Greenalls 1, Wilsons 1, Tetley 2, Whitbread 6, free 1) but these were more than offset by 7 losses (Greenalls 1, Wilsons 1, Whitbread 2, Bass 1, Tetley 1, free 1) and 13 closures (Greenalls 1, Wilsons 8, Whitbread 1, Tetley 2, S&N 1). Two keg pubs also closed but strangely there were no new pubs and no demolitions during the year.

ROYAL OAK

The Royal Oak (Whitbread), Barlow Moor Road, Chorlton-cum-Hardy, has reopened free from the "House of Horrors" treatment. The transformation has resulted in a comfortable pub which now houses a large central bar. A public bar forms part of the extremely large, open-plan lounge and contains a dartboard and pool table. For the first time, probably for many, many years, a juke box has been installed. There are no raised seating areas, no adverse lighting and no awkward steps to fall over. Traditional Chesters bitter has been retained on

handpumps and, as before, the rest is not real ale. Unfortunately draught Bass has not returned.

BEST CELLAR

Frank Spacey, landlord of the Coach & Horses, a 1985 Good Beer Guide pub on Eccles New Road, Salford, was recently presented with his trophy for winning the "Cellar of the Year" award for the second year running in a competition organised by Sam Smiths.

JOHN SMITHS


The Crowthorn on Crowthorn Road, Ashton-under-Lyne, is now selling cask John Smiths.

UPMARKET ORDSALL

The Globe on Regent Road, Salford, is now a Burtonwood "free house" rejoicing in the name Park Royal.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Two Rochdale pubs have recently undergone internal alterations. Following many months of closure, the New Bricklayers on Whitworth Road has been sold by Wilsons. Now reopened as a free house, supplied by John Smiths, it is called Baileys. Handpumped bitter is available. Over on the other side of town at Sudden, another Wilsons pub, the Martins Nest, has been upgraded and is now known as the Waggon and Horses.



WIGAN AND LEIGH NEWS

Two pubs in Leigh have stopped selling Ind Coope Burton Ale - the Railway on Twist Lane (Tetley Walker) and Tropics, Railway Road (Tetley), both due to poor sales. In the case of Tropics this is hardly surprising - a pint of humble Tetley bitter costs 70p there! Greenalls have installed handpumps in the Mechanics Arms, Westleigh, for mild and bitter.

Greenalls Original bitter has disappeared from the New Inn, City Road, Orrell, but the landlord is hoping to get it back on again soon. "Local" mild and bitter (electric) are still available.

GOLDEN NEWIE

Holts have just spent £28,000 on Ye Golden Lion in Blackley village. There have been no structural changes, but everything has been renewed - carpets, upholstery, wallpaper, curtains, etc. It is all very smart.

GOOD NEWS UP THE JUNCTION

After months of closure the Radcliffe in Middleton Junction (opposite Lees Brewery) has reopened its doors. Fears that this Burtonwood pub would "go fizz" proved unfounded. The mild and bitter are now hand-pumped and the previously dowdy pub is quite plush. The brewery have resisted the temptation to completely gut the building (to those of us who saw the place a couple of months ago when it was a bare brick shell this will come as something of a surprise) and the interior layout is relatively unchanged; the overall effect is quite pleasant.

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

REAL ALE IN CENTRAL MANCHESTER

(Amendments to the list in last month's What's Doing)

The Brunswick on London Road has at last reopened and is selling handpumped Wilsons bitter (74p a pint!). The Burton Arms has stopped selling both draught Bass and 4X mild. Sinclairs is now selling Taddy bitter alongside the Old Brewery bitter. The Red Bull is now permanently shut. Sams Chop House was missed out deliberately as it shuts at 7 o'clock and doesn't open at weekends. Cheers was missed out by accident. The Old Bank Street Brewhouse doesn't serve real ale it's under blanket gas pressure. Deerings still sells Tetleys; the strongale at the Jolly Angler is on gravity; the Holts and Boddingtons at the King Billy are handpumped; the Land o'Cakes and the Royal George (Wilsons) both sell mild but the Mark Addy doesn't and the Weavers after its refurbishment is still on handpumps. rumours, neither the Harp & Shamrock nor the Wheatsheaf is keg beer through beer engines. The Church in Ardwick and the Salisbury have both been closed for alterations. The Nelson on Oldham Road is shut and the signs have been removed; builders are in the Pack Horse, further up Oldham Road.

On the credit side, the Good Samaritan, once a Good Beer Guide pub but in recent years fallen from grace, is now under new management. This Wilsons house is undergoing alteration and although only keg mild is at present available, the bitter is now served in excellent condition.

BRANCH OFFICER CHUCKED OUT OF PENNINE JOKE PUB Roger Hall, North Manchester Branch Secretary and Brewery Liaison Officer for Wilsons was refused admittance to the Monton Green on Wednesday 5th December because he was wearing training shoes. The normally mild mannered Mr Hall was incensed by what he referred to as "a callow youth who looked as though he'd been let loose in an Oxfam shop with a half-crown postal order, acting as a sartorial arbiter". Footnote: Mr Hall was narrowly beaten into 3rd place by Rhys Jones and Stewart Revell in last year's CAMRA's Best Dressed Man competition and is described by Paul Roberts as "jober as a sudge".

ASSAM GOVRMET Discover the spice of India

Manchester's latest Indian Restaurant is in the tradition of the Rajdoot, the Gaylord and the Kathmandu. The upmarket Assam Gourmet, next to Paddy's

Goose on Bloom Street, offers authentic cuisine from Assam in North East India. Although the decor and atmosphere is somewhat austere, the food is excellent and good value for money. The spiced prawns and vegetarian thalis are particularly recommended but it's worthwhile experimenting with what to many people will be a novel and unfamiliar menu.

Recently the Asian restaurants in Manchester seem to have polarised with four high quality restaurants in the city centre and a number of much cheaper ethnic cafe/restaurants in the Rusholme area. Although the standard Indian Restaurant still survives, particularly in the suburbs, its future now seems less secure as people become more knowledgeable and discriminating in their choice of food, even when their judgement may be marginally impaired by the odd gallon of Drabs.

Sir - I recently attended the 1984 Amber Nectar Show in Manchester, organised by CAMRA. The event, although not particularly well advertised outside the pages of your organ, promised to be quite a comeback after an absence of five years. Although my friends and I had an enjoyable time, I feel that pen must be applied to

time, I feel that pen must be applied to parchment to draw to your attention a number of points where we felt

that CAMRA fell below its usual standards.

Having attended a number of festivals in various parts of the country over the last few years, I have found that they have all tried to produce examples of local gastronomic delicacies. Where, then, were the black puddings, Hollands pies, Lancashire hot pots and tripe and onions of my youth? Not even a small piece of Lancashire cheese could be found hidden behind the mountains of fat-sodden chips, cardboard bangers and slimy pizzas, so tastlessly displayed. Is this your idea of traditional food, or has the beer jaded your palates? If the standard cannot be improved upon in future years, at least give the punters warning of what to expect so we are not obliged to spend the evening drinking on an empty stomach.

A Scottish visitor to our fair city made a comment that I would like to reiterate. As a stranger attending the "Greater Manchester Beer Festival", he expected to be able to drink at least a pint of beer brewed within the county boundary. With Moonraker quite sensibly being available only in halves, he was sorely disappointed. We are justly proud of our fine local brews, and CAMRA have done so much to promote them in our pubs, so why not at the festival? I am sure that a barrel of Oldham mild would not have been returned.

I think we must be told.
