

Those blokes in the foreign legion advert wishing they were in Greenall Whitley land might be in for a shock if they did come back. Greenalls seem to be beating Wilsons at flogging off their tied estate and letting it fall down. The Travellers Rest in Hindley and the Prince Saxe Coburg in Atherton are both boarded up and for sale. Back in downtown Salford the Old Veteran, which CAMRA was instrumental in saving from the Council's bulldozers, is now in a state of almost total dereliction. Chances of its refurbishment are nil. The Bridge on Regent Road is still boarded up and a question mark hangs over other Greenalls pubs in Salford including the Salisbury and the Champion. Surely the beer can't be so bad that they have to knock the pubs down or perhaps they're rebuilding them in Algeria.

WHAT'S DOING

NEW PUBS?

At a time when the big brewers are allowing many of their pubs to fall into disrepair, it's encouraging to see one or two other individuals swimming against the current and trying to open pubs. In Manchester there have been two applications to turn the bank at 77 Shudehill into a pub and an application to convert 15 Quay Street into a public house with restaurants, conference and exhibition facilities. In Ashton there is a proposal to convert the club on Marlborough Street into a pub.

SADDLEWORTH SOUP KITCHEN

The Cross Keys at New Delph, Saddleworth, has now increased its range of beers to include Theakstons bitter and Old Peculier. Not only was the advent of Theakstons fanfared with an evening at 20p a pint off, but there was also a free bowl of French onion soup for each Theakstons purchaser!

TETLEY GAIN

The Stonemasons, Timperley, for years a Tetley fizz pub, has reopened with a large central bar and loud music. But there are handpumps and the Tetley mild and bitter are on excellent form.

SHUT

Greenalls have decided to sell two more pubs in Bolton. The Peel Hotel, Higher Bridge Street, and the Tanners Arms, Great Lever, are both closed and boarded up, having been classed as "unviable", which in the Peel's case is somewhat surprising. Tetleys have got in on the selling act, too. They have just sold the Railway Inn, a keg pub on Great Moor Street in the town centre, to a local property company. The pub has been sold as a free house. Any chance of an amber nectar emporium?

SAXON CROSS

The astute Mr Winkle has another tied house for the purveyance of his cheeky little bitter - the Plough at Eaton, on the A536 north of Congleton.

OPEN AND SHUT

The Falstaff (Wilsons), Jenner Close, Hulme, has reopened with a new licensee and is still selling traditional ales. Now the Hussar (also Wilsons), Arnott Crescent, Hulme, is closed.

U OR NON-U?

The revitalised Banks's house on Rochdale Road, Manchester, is mostly designated the OSBORNE or OSBORNE HOUSE. But the hanging sign proclaims it as the OSBOURNE and inside there is a picture of OSBOURNE HOUSE, Isle of Wight.

What's Doing has achieved some literary success. Since we drew attention to it in the March issue, the BRITANNIA, Newton Street, central Manchester, is now spelt correctly. The ELLSMERE at Winton is still the ELLSMERE, but then that's Holts for you.

GALLEON SAILS IN

Long after Thwaites closed the Galleon on Drake Street, Rochdale, the pub has reopened as a free house. Owned by the same company which took over the Bridge Inn - now the Merrie Monk - also in Rochdale, the range of beers at the Galleon will be similar to those at the Monk: Marstons bitter, Pedigree and Merrie Monk, Burtonwood bitter and Bulmers traditional cider, all served through handpumps. As with the Monk, lunchtime food will be available.

STOP PRESS: The company has just finalised the purchase of the Dolphin, a Marstons pub near Belle Vue. Opening date expected soon; more details next month.

COLLYHURST CRAWL

The introduction of Banks's to the Osborne and the conversion of the Robert Tinker to traditional beer makes Collyhurst into a Mecca. Well, not exactly, but it's not bad. The seasoned toper could start in the Junction on Queens Road (Tetley) and make her way towards town sampling Robinsons at the Milan Inn, Boddies at the Vine, Greenalls (bitter) at the Swan, Banks's at the Osborne, Wilsons at the Robert Tinker and Chesters in Mamas. With a bit of luck and stamina she could then have seven different pints in the amber nectar shop next door. I forget its name.

PENNINE JOKE

The Pavilion (Wilsons), formerly the White Lion, Withington, is going through yet another phase of alterations. It is now called the Withington Ale House and this time the paved area outside has been dug up, the rails removed and fancy lamp standards have been planted. The downstairs White Lion bar (mainly a games room) is still open (still no real ale). The main pub went over to real ale when it opened as the Pavilion; it is now having the Pennine Host treatment - will the real ale stay?

KING WILLIAM THE FOURTH'S THIRD

Handpumped Tetley mild is now being served alongside Boddies and Holts bitters in the King Billy on Springfield Lane in Salford. The Tetleys bitter is still keg.

BERNI BEER

The Mount, a rather imposing Berni steakhouse on Orrell Road, Orrell, near Wigan, now sells handpumped Tetley bitter and Wilsons mild.

VINTAGE BODDIES

Thanks to the help of Norman Frederickson at the Rope & Anchor, Trafford & Hulme branch secured the loan of Boddingtons' 1938 Albion Dray as a float for the Dunham Rose Queen procession. It's nice to see the brewery can still co-operate with the Campaign on some issues.

DRABS BASS

Holts, who have acquired some half dozen pubs in the last few years and who have moved into the free trade, may be enlarging their tied estate with acquisitions from Bass. The country's biggest brewers have failed to market successfully their excellent beers and their tied houses reflect this with a considerable number of run down and uneconomic pubs. Holts moving in, particularly if it were in areas like Bolton or Wigan, would be a shot in the arm to other brewers who would have to compete with a brewer whose beer is good and cheap and whose pubs are always (well, nearly always) packed.

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
Following the successful refurbishment of Ye Golden Lion, Blackley village, Holts have now given the Duke of Wellington, Higher Blackley, the same treatment. The bar area has been rounded off, but otherwise there are no structural alterations. It is now a most handsome pub, well worth a visit, especially as landlord Jim McCormack has now brought the beer up to Holts' best standard.

HALF NELSON

The Lord Nelson on Chapel Street, Salford, seems to open spasmodically and lack custom. Mind you, with yellow walls and one indifferent beer it's hardly surprising.

SIGNS OF THE TIMES

The Eagle lay in total obscurity on Collier Street for 80 years, attracting little attention except from those who sought it out. What happened when a sign was erected? The place was robbed.



SADDLEWORTH GAINS

Following the concernexpressed recently in WD over the nature of the Oldham Brewery beers being served at the Diggle Hotel, Saddleworth, it has been decided to serve fully cask conditioned Oldham mild and bitter in future. Pleased with the successful introduction of Timothy Taylors Golden Best and Landlord recently. partners Cliff Bucknall and David Jowett have decided to grasp the nettle and provide a welcome return for traditional OB in this part of the area.

Meanwhile, up the hill at the Church Inn, Uppermill, Failsworth bitter has been on sale since Easter. Sales of Matthew Brown's John Peel Special

proved disappointing, several attempts to obtain Theakstons beers failed so Failsworth were approached and were happy to supply. The bitter proved most popular at the recent Saddleworth Beer Festival and is selling well at the Church, too.

BIG JOKE


Visitors to Barnabys on Chorley Old Road, Bolton, have been refused service as the "pub" now chooses to sell drinks only to customers who are eating there. This would seem to defeat the Pennine Joke concept of the "Open House", as advertised on the sign outside. Do Pennine Joke intend to downgrade the licence to "restaurant only" at the next licensing sessions? Will somebody be doing this for them? We'll see.

COCKS

Rumour has it that before the end of June the Globe on Old Road, Ashton-under-Lyne, will become the Gamecock, a free house serving a number of real ales. The pub will join the Woodcock in Halifax, the Red Rooster in Brighouse, the Fighting Cock in Bradford and a new pub in Leeds as part of TFC. These enterprising free houses usually sell ten or eleven real ales, so the future of the Globe-cum-Gamecock looks interesting.

PEEL GREEN PUMPS

The Unicorn (formerly the Jules Verne) is now selling Wilsons mild and bitter through handpumps, albeit expensively and through flash coolers.



ECCLES NOTES

The Bridgewater Hotel (Holts) and the Black Boy (Wilsons), both on Liverpool Road, Eccles, are shut. The former is believed to be ready for a general "refurbishment" and possible extension into the adjacent cottages, whereas the future of the latter is uncertain.

Further down the A57, Robin Bence has extended the range of beers in the Duke of York with the introduction of Ruddles County. It is possible that this beer will be introduced at Robin's other pub, the Crown & Anchor, Hilton Street, Manchester. Both these pubs now sell a selection of CAMRA products previously only available at Beerfests or by post from St Albans. Badge and tie collectors, take note.


REAL ALE IN BOLTON (see centre pages) Any significant improvement in the percentage of real ale pubs is dependent upon the good sense or otherwise of the two Warrington breweries. Tetley Walker have shown no improvement in the last couple of years, apart from selling off some of their estate to the free trade. It is difficult to see why the majority of Tetley pubs in Bolton cannot sell real ale, but the brewery show a marked reluctance to introduce it. On the other hand, Greenall Whitley have, perhaps surprisingly, introduced cask beer into several outlets and converted others to handpumps. Several pubs have been sold into the free trade whilst others remain closed awaiting developments.

Whitbread now have a higher percentage of real ale pubs than either Tetley or Greenalls, even with their weird and often not very wonderful attitude to cask beers. It is difficult to understand why a pub selling three cask beers and short of stillaging space, with a change of manager can be turned into a keg-only outlet with the cry of "no demand for real ale". Whitbread pubs are still charging the top price for beer in Bolton.

Most Bass pubs are grotty dumps or awful estate pubs with beer to match, though in the few that don't fall in these categories, real ale would be a distinct possibility; perhaps the brewery will wake up to this fact.

Of all the breweries with a significant number of keg pubs, perhaps the one with the least understandable policy on cask beers is Matthew Brown, who only have one cask outlet in their nine pubs. Perhaps after the Scottish & Newcastle business has died down they will concentrate on improving the situation.

The solitary Vaux pub now sells Wards bitter as well as Samson, though it is uncertain whether or not a pint is a pint. The beer is still served in unlined, oversize glasses and so never filled to the top.



WITHINGTON ALE

Withington has another real ale outlet. The Red Lion on Wilmslow Road, a large, rambling old Marstons pub, now sells Pedigree, mild and bitter on handpumps.

TRUE FRIENDSHIP

The refurbishment of the Friendship on Lees Road, Oldham, has now been completed. The pub has been extended towards the rear, giving a kitchen and a beer garden. The bar has been moved from its cramped site near the door to facilitate better usage of space and the vault has been given a coat of paint. Landlord Phil Whiteman resisted Wilsons' suggestion that the "Pub 80" theme should be used and the results are good; a definite improvement in the character of the house.

AINSWORTH RENOVATIONS

Peter Walkers have renovated the Ainsworth Arms, Halliwell Road, Bolton. They haven't resorted to plastic beams or bare wooded floors, as is fashionable with some brewers today, and the new-style Ainsworth looks smarter than the old. With the resiting of the public bar to the left of the main room it looks a lot roomier, too.

MANCHESTER CITY CENTRE BEER PRICES (going up!) The following prices were charged for a pint of bitter on a recent survey. First, four Pennine Joke houses: Brunswick 74p (no traditional mild); Oxfords 75p (no real beer in the lounge); Sawyers Arms 80p (for fizz); Shakespeare 75p (for fizz). At the Portland Bar on Portland Street, Ind Coope's Burton Ale sells for an astounding 84p a pint! The same beer at the City Arms on Kennedy Street is a modest 72p.



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
