NEW ROAD PLAN SAVES ECCLES PUBS

CAMRA has won a reprieve for the Royal Oak and Crown & Volunteer in Eccles. The two Holts pubs were to be demolished for a new road scheme, as outlined in What's Doing in November. As well as the pubs, the houses and the Borough Band Room on Corporation Road and the doctor's surgery on Church Street were to go. CAMRA set up a campaign and formed an action group with local residents and the Borough Band. Holts Brewery joined in and an alternative plan, designed by a CAMRA member, was submitted to the planners. This re-routes the new road via the Health Centre and the Labour Exchange (newish buildings which can easily be re-located) and the video shop on the other side of Corporation Road. The planners have accepted this proposal and it will now be put before the full Council Planning Committee for approval.

UNHOLY ALLIANCE

Speculation about a possible merger of Whitbread and Allied Breweries has resurfaced. This move, to avoid the reduction in pub ownership required by the Monopolies & Mergers Commission, would result in an enormous combine with over 12,000 pubs. The breweries would presumably be hived off a la Courage into a separate organisation with a 25% market share. The twin threats, as ever, are to breweries and to beers. What's Doing has already suggested that Whitbread's considerable portfolio will be rationalized. A merger with Allied would make that rationalization take place sooner rather than later.

(Other beers in the Whitbread portfolio are produced at breweries which are not under Whitbread's direct control, such as Pompey Royal and Marstons Pedigree)

That's 49 beers from 11 breweries. How many of these are likely to survive? Given Whitbread's record of closures and badge brewing, the demise of perhaps a dozen beers and two or three breweries may be expected. The MMC, which in the past has demonstrated spineless compliance, will, of course, have to be consulted. In Manchester, we can perhaps look forward to the demise of OB mild and bitter, Castle Eden, Chesters bitter and Greenalls mild and bitter in the immediate future, with more to follow as the rationalization progresses in the hands of blinkered accountants.

If the merger does go ahead, where does this leave CAMRA's boycott of Whitbread? Will we be asked to shun all Allied products as well? What on earth will we be able to drink? Holts? According to Beinlos, that's pretty ropey. So, it's down to Tescos and crates of Chimay!

To make things a little easier this year the festival will be closed on the Wednesday afternoon and for two hours on Saturday afternoon.

Dramatic changes are taking place at the Welcome Inn (Holts) on Bury Old Road. Its a long time since music has been heard in the place (apart from the taped variety), but Sunday nights at the Welcome are now definitely 'rocking'.

The new licensee is Christopher Smalley, who has come from the Broadway in Salford. The place is currently being re-wired prior to a refit which will include new carpets, furniture and tapestry-style upholstered fixed seating. Handpumps are coming back and the upstairs function room, which has been closed for several years, is to be reopened for public use. Chris also intends to have regular quiz nights and, in the warmer months, beer garden bar-b-q's. Also being considered is the possibility of regular 'dance sessions' upstairs - blimey! The Welcome will never be the same again!

In Prestwich village, Davenport's bitter has disappeared from the Grapes (Greenalls) and has been replaced with Stones bitter.

The bad news is that Brett the dog at the Welcome has died, aged 19 years; the Langworthy is still on keg Whitbread and, back on Oldfield Road, the beer at the Wellington (Boddies mild and bitter) was only just palatable and at the Kings Arms (Holts bitter) it wasn't very good.

UNICORN SHEDS SCAFFOLDING

The refit at the Unicorn in Hale Barns is now complete and the awful red spiked ceiling has gone. (The customers held a sponsored smash-up for charity.) The interior is much improved and has a more leisurely atmosphere. There is comfortable, quality seating in different areas, no gimmicks and no loud music.

The vault has been retained as a separate, carpeted "games area" and there is now no price differential between the lounge and the vault areas. The upstairs has been transformed and now boasts a function room with traditional ale and a dance floor if required. The pub now has five letting bedrooms.

Food is available from the main bar every session except Sunday evenings, and Hydes bitter and Light are served through electric metered pumps in oversize glasses.

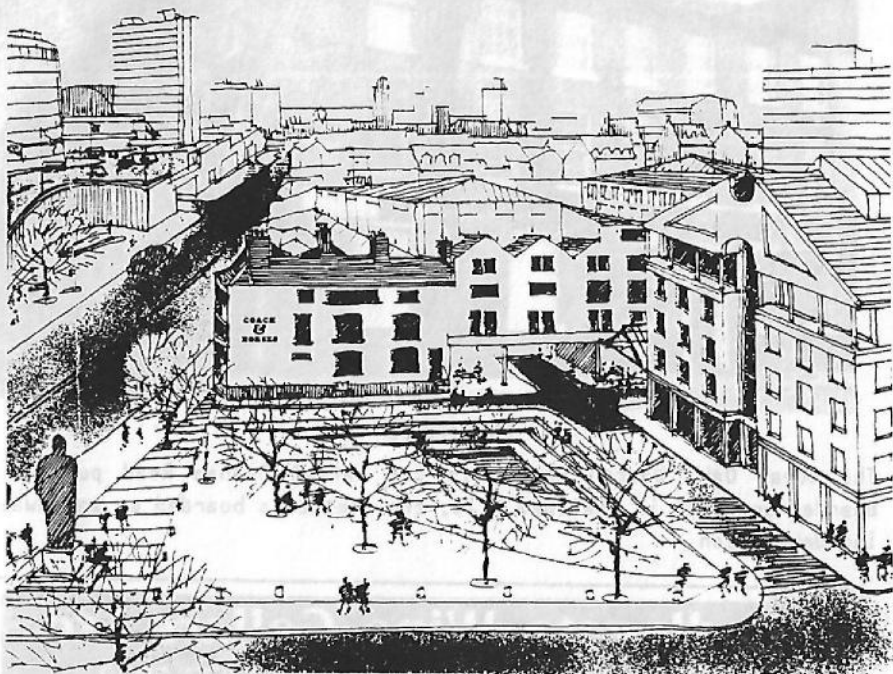
ARSON ABOUT

COACH & HORSES STUDY

Further to the report in last month's WD on the Strategy Study for the Coach & Horses, London Road, Manchester, favourable comments have already been received. In a letter, the Central Manchester Development Corporation stated that the report contained several "thought provoking ideas" and that they would study it in depth before responding in full. A meeting is to be arranged between the CMDC and CAMRA's architect, accompanied by members of the Campaign.



On 22nd February I presented a copy of the Study (prepared by DC Architects on a commission from the Greater Manchester CAMRA branches) to the Lord Mayor of Manchester, Cllr John Gilmore. The Lord Mayor told me that he is a keen supporter of the Campaign to save the Coach & Horses and before he became Mayor he had written to the Manchester Evening News to express his concern about the fate of the pub. Indeed, the Mayor remembers the Coach & Horses in the 1920s. As a 6-year-old boy he was taken by his mother to the pub to visit his Great Aunt Maud, who was the landlady at the time. He also recalled being served ginger beer from a stone jug.

The Lord Mayor wished CAMRA success and assured me that the report would be passed on to the City Planning Officer, Dr Ted Kitchen.

SHORTER OXFORD

The recently reopened Oxford in Salford's Bexley Square is now boarded up - yet another pub to join the long roll call of closed licensed premises in the inner city. The Church at the back remains open.

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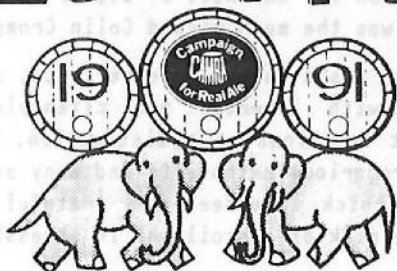

PUB MUSIC

Sir - In reply to John Lawrance (Feb WD), regarding music in pubs...

Professional entertainers working on licensed premises are rarely third rate artistes. Most are young and still putting their acts together but sure to go on to greater things. I saw Marty Caine, Englebert Humperdinck (then working as Gerry Dorsey) and the Beatles perform in pubs before they were well known. Some artistes never lose touch with their roots and go back to the little pubs and clubs which gave them their starts. Usually billed as 'Guest Spot' or 'Surprise Artiste', they go on for the hell of it, or from a sense of gratitude. Just one example was the much missed Colin Crompton.

Very loud recorded music is, in my experience, a characteristic of far downmarket pubs with licensee and clientele to match. Here the fortissimo racket functions as a distraction, not an attraction. Not all of us are gregarious extroverts and many social misfits, grunting adolescents and thick licensees are grateful for a background din which removes the risk of embroilment in stressful conversation.

Mr Lawrance is also wrong about the churches. In my experience, they are increasingly important in influencing people of all ages and the success of questionable cults in evangelising the young has recently led the established religions to be more adventurous. For example, most Roman Catholic churches have a licensed club alongside; this acts as a focal point for the church's social activities, which are advertised in such a way as to target the younger person.

Finally, I doubt whether licensees see themselves as appointed to influence public taste, character and educational standards. I imagine that most see their job as running pubs. And I dare say the application and selection processes involved in appointing a licensee are less open to criticism than the Machiavellian backstage deals and calling-in of favours used to parachute school heads and Town Hall councillors into office!

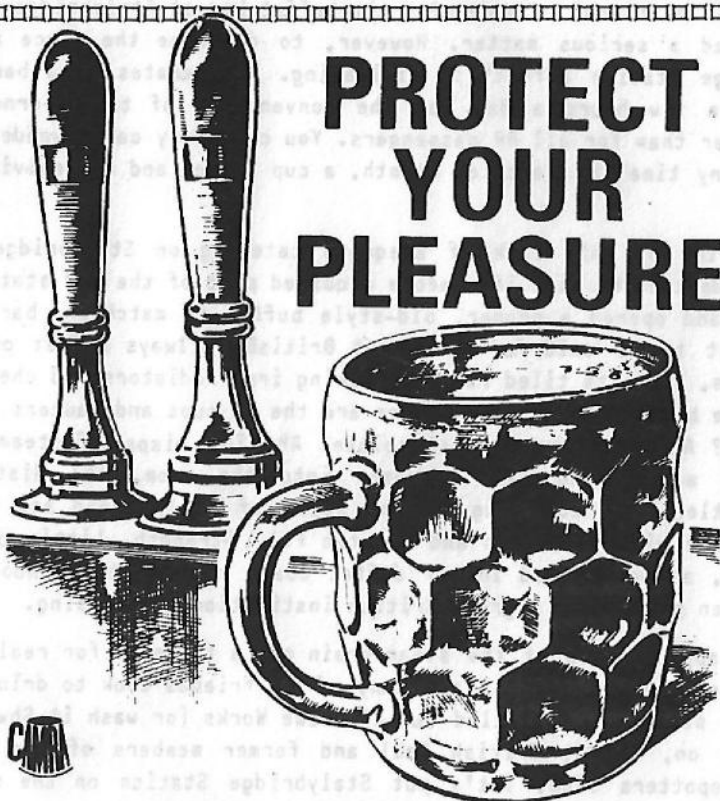

Back Grosvenor Street

Last month's subject was the Old Thirteenth Cheshire Astley Volunteer Rifleman Corps Inn in Stalybridge - the pub with the longest name in the United Kingdom. Sixty years ago Stalybridge could also boast the pub with the shortest name in the UK. The "Q" was in the middle of town, on the corner of Back Grosvenor Street and Trinity Street and backed on to the Huddersfield Canal. Today the site is cleared and occupied by a car park.

It was first licensed in 1842 as a beerhouse called the White Hart. A full licence had been obtained by 1848 and four years later the name was changed to the Q Inn. Schofield's Brewery of Ashton bought the pub for £5,450 in 1896 and Robinsons of Stockport took over thirty years later. The Q closed in 1934.

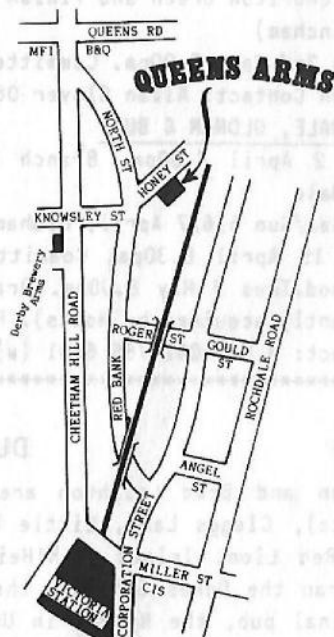
