### TETLEY CLOSE ONE ....

The Moulders Arms, Heyrod Street, Ancoats, will soon join the ever-growing list of Manchester pubs closed by the big breweries. If Tetley's record is anything to go by, there isn't much chance of the pub continuing as a free house.

#### AND GREENALLS SELL ANOTHER

The Crown, Derby Street, Bolton, is to become a social club for Buffs members. The pub is situated next to the former Magee Marshall brewery and was once the brewery tap. It is understood that the building will be sold only on condition that Greenalls beers will be sold (surprise, surprise!)

In the past year, Greenalls have sold the Alma to Burtonwoods and the Ancient Shepherd to Thwaites. If their policy continues, Bolton will soon have no traditional Greenalls outlets, as the Tanners on Lever Street has recently gone over to bright beer.

Another pub sold by Greenalls to Burtonwood was the Scot Lane Inn. It is due to reopen soon, the new licensee coming from the Royal Oak, Liscard, Wirral, a Good Beer Guide pub.

#### JOHN SMITHS - WHY NO REAL ALE ?

"One of the few remaining examples of old fashioned draught bitter. It's still matured in the cask. It still has the subtle, distinctive, old fashioned flavour. Your landlord won't serve it until it's reached its full character."

What does that describe? A pint of Walkers? Wilsons? Robinsons? It could describe many a pint of bitter in Greater Manchester. Actually, it's an advert for Courage Best Bitter.

So why, if it's good enough for the South, can't we have real Courage in the North? In the past 50 years, the companies that eventually formed Courage (now part of Imperial Tobacco) have taken over more than 50 breweries between them and with them has gone part of our heritage – local beers, local firms, local pubs.

In the North the company operate at John Smiths Tadcaster Brewery Ltd, which only produces keg and bright beer. The Barnsley Brewery, John Smiths'only real ale brewery, was closed in 1975 and since then Smiths have refused to supply any traditional beer to their pubs in the North West. Despite protests, Smiths turn a deaf ear and steadfastly claim that there is "no demand for real ale ". Have they asked Wilsons, who were convinced by CAMRA that there was a demand and subsequently changed their policy? (The change, incidentally, seems as popular with their customers as was predicted.) Have they asked the public if they would like a choice of "old fashioned draught bitter"?

Smiths' once renowned beers (remember Magnet Bitter?) have been reduced to thin, fizzy, processed products. Courage/John Smiths won't give us, the customers, the choice – or the chance – of traditional beer, and only concerted action can convince them that there is a demand for real ale. If you are concerned about John Smiths' policies, why not write to them and say so? Saturday 1st November 11,00am - 3,00pm


5.00pm - 11.00pm

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#### REAL ALE IN DUSSELDORF

Düsseldorf is the state capital of Nordrhein-Westfalen, with a population of well over half a million. It is the headquarters of much of German industry and also boasts its own peculiar brewing style. Throughout Germany Dusseldorf is renowned for its 'Alt' bier.

As German scholars will know, this literally means 'old beer', but it must not be confused with the old ale ranges in Britain. The most common explanation given for the derivation of the term 'Alt' comes from the fact that Altbier is brewed by top fermentation rather than by the more modern and much more common bottom fermentation.

Altbier is usually a medium-brown-coloured beer, although in some particular brews it can be very dark, like a dark mild in Britain. It has an alcoholic content of just over 3.5% and therefore has a similar strength to the weaker British bitters. Like the Kolsch beers of Köln described last month by Jim Davies, Altbier is usually served in .2 litre glasses.

The pubs of Düsseldorf seem to reflect the character of the town itself. There are many modern pubs in the main city centre, along with the usual collection of speciality bars in the Red Light district. The greatest number and best choice of pubs can be found in the Altstadt or 'Old Town' district, which is linked to commercial Düsseldorf by the infamous Königsallee, which at the moment is in the process of being ripped apart to provide Düsseldorf with a U-Bahn. The tourist guide claims that one can find over 200 inns within the one square kilometer of Altstadt. As I was only there for three evenings, I am unable to confirm this claim – we only managed three-quarters of them!

Altstadt boasts several home brew pubs and brewery taps. The most famous home brew one is Zum Üerige on the corner of Bergerstrasse. This building, looking quite unimpressive from the exterior, gives way to a whole warren of beerhalls inside. In one of these halls is a huge window from where one can observe the brewing process whilst sampling the end product. In my opinion, this was not only the cheapest Altbier but also the best – 90 Pfennig for .251. On a Friday evening in Zum Uerige we observed a newly tapped 150 litre barrel being emptied in under three minutes! Like the Kölnbierhalls, Düsseldorf halls are served by an army of Köbes (Jacobs) wearing the traditional all-blue un uniform.

Another home brew pub in Altstadt is Ferdinand Schumacher – the beer here has a rather metallic taste not too dissimilar to a brew produced not a million miles from Middleton Junction. Schumacher's main pub is at 123 Oststrasse in the main shopping centre. Brewing ale like that, he certainly lives up to his name (Cobblers!) A more pleasant home brew was found in Altstadt on Ratingerstrasse at Im Fuchschen, which lives up to its name with a ceiling festooned with stuffed foxes.

The largest Altbierbräuerei is Schlösser and their own brewery tap is very similar to

















a home brew pub, with huge beer halls and a high frequency Jacob service. The Gatzweiler brewery tap is also in central Altstadt and is certainly worth a visit.

Whilst not finding Altbier quite as enjoyable as Kölsch, it is still a very palatable drink (especially Zum Üerige) and in my opinion is superior to most British beers. As Düsseldorf is within easy reach of the two other main brewing centres of Nordrheinland – Westfalen, these being Köln and Dortmund, it makes an ideal centre for a beer drinking holiday. The other advantage is the other tourists – there aren't any!

Empty seats in the restaurant half meant that that idea had had its chips, so now full lunches are offered six days a week including a "businessman's" lunch. From 7.00 until 10.00 in the evening (except Sunday) it becomes a steakhouse. Present landlord Dave Clayton took over in mid August and assures us that he will continue with cask bitter and, if demand makes it possible, revert to cask mild as well.


Another pub to change hands in August was the Old Packet House (handpumped Wilsons)
Manchester Road, Broadheath, on the banks of the Bridgewater Canal. It was once a staging
post for the packet boats. New manager Pete Fidler used to have the Malt Shovel in Cheadle
and he is enjoying the change from tank beer to cask conditioned bitter and mild.

#### BOT OF THE MANCHESTER BREWERY COLD

BROADIE STREET, ARDWICK, MANCHESTER

Michael Jacobson, in "200 Years of Beer", records that Boddingtons' two nearest rivals during the 1860s were Threlfalls and Deakins. Of these two, Threlfalls is still a well-remembered name but Deakins, later the Manchester Brewery Company, has passed into obscurity. Despite early prosperity, bad management and over ambitious expansion brought the firm to the very edge of bankruptcy. Saved by the intervention of Wal ker & Homfrays, the company enjoyed a further period of activity until the 1920s, when all brewing ceased at MBC's Britannia Brewery. From then on the concern became just a "paper company" and as such passed to Wilsons Brewery with the takeover of Walker & Homfrays in 1949.

As far back as 1838 a brewery existed on Broadie Street in Ardwick, then in the hands of a brewer called William Nell. By 1848, the occupiers were Benjamin Smith and Sons and the premises had been named the Britannia Brewery. The name Benjamin Smith appears nearly sixty years later on a list of directors of the Manchester Brewery Company. It is unclear whether or not this is a coincidence.

The first mention of the Deakins is around 1850, when various members of the family are listed as pub owners and brewers. George Deakin brewed at Butler Street, Oldham Road and owned such pubs as the Grapes on Great Ancoats Street, the Rainbow Hotel in Spring Gardens and the Brown Cow, Canal Street. James Deakin, who brewed at Kenyon Street, Rochdale Road, also kept several houses, like the Egerton Arms at 179 Chester Road which eventually passed to Wilsons. James Henry Deakin had taken control of the Britannia Brewery by 1860.

In 1888 the Manchester Brewery Company Ltd was formed, with John and Edward Deakin as joint managing directors. The following year MBC's Chairman, H J Gurdon-Rebow, became involved with the purchase of three breweries and a distillery in Prague for £324,000. Gurdon-Rebow served as a director of the new company, called Bohemian Breweries Ltd. MBC itself became more directly involved with several other companies during the next few years. John Ratcliffe's Coldhurst Brewery in Oldham was acquired in 1889. A number of pubs accompanied the purchase, examples being the Lancashire Hotel, Higginshaw Lane and the Queens Arms, Busk Street.

Nathan P Sandiford was a wine and spirit merchant who founded his business at premises on Chester Road, Hulme. When Greenall Whitley bought out James Hampson of Northwich in 1888, their brewery on Witton Street became available. Sandifords then leased or bought the building to brew their own beer for a time. In 1895, N P Sandiford sold out to MBC and joined the board as joint managing director with W R

Deakin. At this time, MBC also had a mortgage on a brewery in Walsall, in addition to owning the one in Oldham.

During 1899, MBC bought Broadbents Ltd, Wingfields Silverwell Brewery Co Ltd and entered into a contract to buy the property of G F Carrington & Sons. In the case of Carringtons, the purchase was not completed until seven years later. Carrington stopped brewing at the Clarence Brewery, Hulme and probably received supplies of beer from MBC during this period. Broadbents was liquidated shortly after the takeover but later all the property had to be sold to Threlfalls because of financial troubles. The proceeds of the sale were used to pay mortgages amounting to £62,500. Also liquidated shortly after takeover was Wingfields of Bolton.

Rather unwisely, MBC entered into a contract during 1901 to buy land in Trafford Park at a chief rent of £1,046 per year and to erect, prior to March 1906, a brewery costing at least £40,000. The brewery was never built. Edward Deakin died from a severe attack of gastritis on 23rd March 1903. The next year, the worsening financial situation came to a head. In an attempt to save the company, several directors were dismissed and replaced with members of known business ability. The removal of Benjamin Smith, the old managing director, cost the firm £2,000. Smith still had three years to run under an agreement which guaranteed him £1,250 a year. The other directors were less fortunate; they had to pay the firm £12,000 to avoid being taken to court. The lineup of Gurdon-Rebow, Smith, D E Cardinal, H A Haig, R J Wood and John Deakin gave way to a new board consisting of John Henry Davies (Chairman), G E Haworth, N P F Sandiford and W R Deakin, John Deakin, however, remained on good terms with the company. The new Chairman, J H Davies, had occupied a similar position on the board of Walker & Homfrays since 1902 and was an up and coming figure in the trade. Various measures were taken: improvement in the quality of beer, renovation of property, development of a bottling plant, the writing down of the company's capital and the disposal of Broadbent's property.

Walker & Homfrays gained complete control of the Manchester Brewery Company in 1912, when they agreed to buy 93% of the share capital. Brewing at the Britannia Brewery did not continue past 1924 – by this date MBC had been transferred to Walker & Homfrays Woodside Brewery. Under the control of W&H, MBC acquired Chadwicks Walmersley Brewery Ltd and Stopfords Brewery Co Ltd in 1927. The Palatine Bottling Co, a W&H subsidiary, moved into Stopfords Imperial Brewery on Birch Street, West Gorton, and Stopford pubs were also transferred to Palatine.

MBC's tied estate was quite extensive, reaching as far as Kidderminster in the south and Barrow in Furness in the north. The letters "MBC" can still be seen in the tilework of the George in Bolton as well as on the stonework of a number of other pubs. Most ex-MBC pubs, however, show no signs of their origin.

The Manchester Brewery Company was officially liquidated on 6th November 1956. Nothing now remains of the Britannia Brewery but, although Broadie Street no longer exists, the exact site can be pinpointed. The brewery stood on the south bank of the River Medlock, to the left of Hoyle Street as you walk towards Temperance Street from the Mancunian Way.

The "new" beer will be sold in about 100 pubs and the brewery hope to build the number of outlets back up again. It is likely, therefore, that several pubs which are on the list because they sell Warrington Ale may by now be kea or tank only again.

#### WELLINGTON GETS THE BOOT


