ANOTHER PUB FOR HOLTS



Holts have bought the Cross Yates, Whitworth Road, Rochdale, from Bass. This very basic pub is now awaiting the Holts redecoration. Mild (40p) and bitter (42p) are now available from handpumps. This is the first Holts pub in Rochdale.

Hoits have also moved into the free trade: the bitter (41p) is on sale at Newtown Social Club (CIU) on Nixon Street, Castleton, Rochdale, and the beers are also available at Prestwich Liberal Club, Bury New Road.

BURY BEER FESTIVAL

As promised last month, full details are now available for the forthcoming beer extravaganza at the Derby Hall, Market Street, Bury. The festival is to be held over Friday/Saturday 4th/5th December and will be open between 11.30-3.00 and

5.00 - 11.00 on both days. The range of amber nectars is yet to be finalised but, subject to satisfactory responses from the breweries concerned, it is hoped to feature such brews as Ruddles, Everards, Greene King, Adnams, Elgoods and Hoskins from the East Anglian region and Wadworths, Eldridge Pope and Hall & Woodhouse from the south west. The micro-breweries will be ably represented by the local West Riding and Two Shires, and possibly Smiles, Butcombe and Mendip from Avon. Entertainment at the evening sessions will feature two brass bands with a Buster Keaton film show on Friday lunch (no kidding!) Good food will be available throughout the festival.

Entrance fees will be 20p at lunchtimes and up to 7.30pm, and 50p thereafter. Admission to card carrying CAMRA members will be free. No tickets, just pay at the door – but come early! For further details contact Steve Lawton 061 620 9239 (h) or 061 236 4411 (ext 7237)

REGENT ROAD

Salford Council's continued attempts to accomplish what the Luftwaffe failed to do come to a head this month at a public enquiry to be held over three days at Swinton Civic Centre from 24th – 26th November. The inquiry concerns the compulsory purchase of land north of Regent Road, which includes 9 pubs, 2 of which are no longer used.

Once again the planners have trotted out the same hackneyed reasons, couched in the same bureaucratic gobbledygook. They say that "the overall impression of the Regent Road frontage is one of dereliction and neglect" and that "the retention of a dilapidated and run-down main road frontage until the implementation of the highway improvement which is at least 10 years hence would be severely detrimental to the success of the redevelopment of the remaining lands within the Order and contrary to the objectives of the Enterprise Zone". In other words, it's a damn sight easier to start with a clean slate rather than to try to integrate the old and the new.

It's worth while having a look at Salford's record of wholesale redevelopment in the last 20 years and what their present proposals will mean for Regent Road. Trinity and Hanky Park were the first areas to be comprehensively redeveloped and almost everything was swept away by the bulldozer. The "visual amenity" is arguably better but virtually all sense of community has been lost. The retention of existing street patterns and some public houses may have helped to prevent this loss of a sense of belonging.

Since 1963 no fewer than 28 pubs have closed in the area immediately surrounding Regent Road. Two have been rebuilt (Regent Queens) and 5 new pubs have been built (Rovers Return, Sabre, Jubilee, Chequerboard, Moonraker). If the proposals to clear Regent Road proceed there will be only 8 public houses in the area bounded by Oldfield Road, Ordsall Lane, Trafford Road, Cross Lane and Liverpool Street. This is clearly inadequate, particularly as the enterprise zone is expected to bring employment to the area. No doubt it would be necessary to supplement the existing stock of public houses with new pubs.

Rarely do new pubs succeed in achieving the atmosphere and character which our older public houses possess. They are uniform and unimaginative in design, similar in size and unsuccessful in the way they make use of space. They cannot immediately become part of the community in which they are located. In contrast, a random selection of existing pubs would reveal a variety of sizes, architectural styles and character which has evolved over a number of years. The Regent Road pubs certainly fall into this category. The seven threatened pubs represent seven different breweries, only 5 of which are present elsewhere in the area. The Gloucester is Pollard's only tied house and the only outlet in Salford.

Regent Road's pubs are reasonably maintained buildings. Any appearance of "a dilapidated and run down" frontage has been caused entirely by former demolition and the uncertain future of the area. Regent Road, in common with other parts of the City, has been blighted by vague planning proposals. The seven pubs have survived a period of colossal upheaval and are evidently considered viable by the brewers. The retention of the pubs for 10 years would certainly benefit the community, provide ready-made leisure facilities for people in the enterprise zone and help to span the transition from the Regent Road of the 1970s to the Regent Road of the 1990s. If the road widening does eventually take place, the pubs could perhaps be rebuilt near their present locations, which may create a better feeling of continuity than comprehensive redevelopment can achieve.

In previous compulsory purchase orders Salford's planners have argued about the absolute necessity of acquiring certain sites and their arguments have won the day. Who would want to retain a public house when the site could be used for 4 bed-spaces or a playground? Yet a survey of the sites of former pubs reveals that little has been done with them. The Welcome on Ordsall Lane was to be replaced with a play area. The play area is unused, semi derelict and could have been located 20 feet away without affecting the pub. To the untutored eye it is also more detrimental to visual amenity than the pub ever was.

The 'Big Derby' on Derby Street had to come down to make way for a football field. For years the football field remained as a rubbish-strewn croft. The Derby



could easily have remained on the edge of the field. The list of unused sites in Salford is almost endless, yet the arguments for demolition are still used. The site can't be adequately developed, access is bad, etc.

In three recent Public Inquiries the Council's requests to demolish pubs have been refused. The Inspector in each case appreciated the role which the pub plays in the community and the spurious nature of arguments which suggested that a building occupying some 200 square yards was an impediment to the development of an area of several acres. The Grey Mare, the Old Veteran and the Priory will survive the demolition around them and continue to serve the new residents of Weaste and Brunswick in they way they have done for upwards of a century. The brewers and the licensees are evidently optimistic about the future of these 3 houses.

There is no reason why the pubs of Regent Road should not survive. The amount of land they occupy is negligible and not a serious barrier to rebuilding. More, rather than less, pubs will be needed as more people move into the area. The brewers are convinced of their viability. Most importantly, however, the pubs are part of Salford. They are an important link with the past, something which creates the individuality and character that is Salford. Their loss would mean more than the disappearance of some familiar landmarks. It would mean the severing of another piece of identity in a city already devastated by the imposition of blandness and conformity.

WHAT'S DOING

ALTY ALTERATIONS

The rumoured switch from Whitbread to Hydes of the Bakers Arms, half way between the Jolly Friar (Greenalls, real bitter, keg mild), Lloyd Street, Altrincham and the Tatton Arms (Boddingtons), Tipping Street, should have taken place by the time you read this. It remains to be seen whether Hydes will spend any money on improvements; the vault in particular is rather bare and gloomy.

The scaffolding outside the Unicorn, Old Market Place, was an indication that major renovation work was planned. Eventually it will be completely 'done up' and it seems probable that Chesters mild in traditional form will join the bitter on handpumps. The Unicorn also has bed and breakfast accommodation (13 beds) and joins the Barrington (7 beds) as the only real ale B&B's in the area.

The promised write-up for the Grapes (Regent Road - Boddingtons) will have to wait. Although well enough advanced for customers to be able to drink in comfort, it is still far from finished.

ANCHOR RANCOUR

The Crown & Anchor on Hilton Street (near Piccadilly Gardens), Manchester, recently changed landlords and became one of Whitbread's "experimental" pubs, selling Thwaites bitter, Marstons Pedigree and Bulmers draught cider alongside the Chesters mild and bitter, all on handpump. At first the Thwaites sold extremely well but then deliveries became mysteriously patchy until they ceased altogether. Sales swiftly shifted to Marstons, which easily outsold everything else until very recently, when the brewery removed that as well. The change appears to be permanent

since both handpumps have been removed and replaced with bright new Trophy dispensers. So much for Whitbread being unafraid of competition.

LOWER BROUGHTON BEER DESERT?

On a recent tour of Lower Broughton real ale was in short supply. The (real) mild in the Irwell Castle was sour and undrinkable. It was with great reluctance that the barmaid in the Grosvenor eventually served some Chesters bitter. Neither the Vavasour nor the Albert had any Chesters at all and the Palatine (Greenalls) had been converted to keg.

Since the Albert was an entry for the 1982 Good Beer Guide, the pub was revisited to ensure the absence of cask beer was only temporary. Alas, there was still no beer and the handpumps are to be removed. The reason was that the beer was "inconsistent"; cloudy pints would appear for no apparent reason and a lot of beer needed to be returned to the brewery.

The other Chesters entry for the GBG, the Red Bull, Mason Street, still had cask beer and it was in good form. The landlord explained that he had had trouble with cloudiness at first but was now quite happy with the beer. He believed that it was a lot to do with knowing how to look after cask beer, something which many Whitbread licensees had not experienced for some considerable time. Ironically, he would like to install cask mild, but the brewery will not allow him to have it. CEMETERY STIRRINGS

The range of beers at the Cemetery, Bury Road, Rochdale has just been changed. Taylors porter is back for the winter and joins the best bitter, Landlord and dark mild. Wilsons has gone, not surprisingly, to be replaced by various guest beers. Moorhouses was available until recently and Saxon Cross is on the cards. The licensee will collect beers herself, so let her know your preferences (in the amber nectar related field!)

MORE AMBER NECTAR

Youngers No 3 has at last arrived in Greater Manchester and is now on sale at the Church Inn at Uppermill, Saddleworth (as well as Youngers IPA) and also at the Lord Raglan, Nangreaves, Bury (54p). Down the road from the Raglan, the Masons Arms (free house) is now selling Wilsons mild and bitter on handpumps. Still on the old road up to Nangreaves, the new landlord of the Hark to Dandler has installed two handpumps to dispense traditional IPA at 58p a pint. The locals are now allowed to play traditional pub games such as cards, which were previously banned, as they were not in keeping with the image of this Tartanised lounge pub.

GREENALL GRUMBLINGS

Nigel Park, landlord of the Dog and Pheasant, Manchester Road, Westhoughton, is moving to the White Crow, Worthington, near Standish. The Dog & Pheasant is to be leased to someone who wants to turn it into a "Fun Pub". This exciting new concept will involve making the lounge into one big room, moving the bar to the back wall and, of course, replacing the cask beer by keg. Sounds like a barrel of laughs eh, Fred? – Yet another case of Smile Please, You're in Greenall Whitley Land?



CHEAPEST IN MANCHESTER?

A recent change from Robinsons ordinary bitter to best bitter at the Blue Bell, Shaw, was not accompanied by a price increase. Current lounge price is 46p - is this a record?

GROVE CONCERN

An application has been made to alter and extend the Grove Inn, Bury New Road on the Manchester/Salford boundary. Alterations are certainly necessary. The vault is served by an enormous bar, whilst a tiny hatch in the back of the bar is the only service point for the other 3 rooms in the pub. The Grove dates back to the eighteenth century and is a building of some character. It is to be hoped that Boddingtons' treatment of the pub is sympathetic to both the internal layout and external aspect of the Grove.

NAGGING QUESTION (2)

Although they are promoting a traditional image, the Chesters bitter Whitbread are promoting at the Nags Head, Irlam, is anything but traditional. The prices charged are 46p in the vault and 47p on the best side, compared with Trophy bitter at 49p and 50p. Traditional Chesters bitter, sold in many Whitbread outlets, usually retails at 50p to 52p. This kind of behaviour can only lead to further speculation concerning Whitbread's future commitment to real ale.

GEORGE AND DLAGON

One of South Manchester CAMRA's entries for the 1982 GBG now has its own builtin Chinese restaurant. The George (Higsons), Mersey Square, Stockport, is very likely unique in this venture. The restaurant's entrance is in Heaton Lane, and it is named the "Golden City".

CAMRA BOWLING TOURNAMENT

The 4th October was an historic day for the Rochdale, Oldham & Bury branch, when their first CAMRA Open Bowling Tournament was launched at the Eagle and Child, Whitefield. Tony Smith, landlord of this impressive Holts pub, is himself a keen bowler and enthusiastic real ale drinker. A generous gesture by Tony was to donate the trophy, which will now be played for annually. Many thanks also to the Eagle & Child Bowling Club, without whose help the tournament would not have been possible. Fine weather contributed, along with good food and beer - not to mention the extension - to an enjoyable day.

POACHER

The Poacher, Scot Lane, Blackrod is now selling, for a trial period, Burtonwood light mild. The pub was acquired by Burtonwood a year or so ago from Greenalls, when it was called the Scot Lane Inn. Trade has been steadily improving and excellent lunchtime and evening meals and snacks are available. The Poacher is the third pub in the Bolton branch area to give light mild a try. The pub is at the south end of the village, at the junction of Scot Lane and Manchester Road, about 10 minutes walk from Blackrod Station and the 313, 616 and 618 buses pass the door.

MORE HANDPUMPS

In line with their policy of installing handpumps in cask managed houses, Tetley have put sets in the Bulls Head, Leigh and Miners Arms, Astley, the latter having been turned into a very pleasant local.

PUB OF THE MONTH

The South Manchester branch Pub of the Month for November is the Castlewood, Bridge Street Brow, off Great Underbank, Stockport. Excellent handpumped Wilsons mild and bitter is served in this somewhat unusual two-level pub - both

PUB OF THE MONTH (2)

South Lancs Pub of the Month for October was the Carders Arms, Hindsford, Atherton, which must rate as one of Greenalls' best attempts at enlargement and moderni sation. The vault is now as large as the whole pub was before, and it's nice to see pool and space invaders well away from those out for a quiet drink or a game of cards or dominoes. The brand-new lounge is large and well-appointed.

While on the subject of enlightened pub improvements, Burtonwood receives the November accolade for the Houghton Arms, Earlestown, where a plain pub has been interestingly upgraded. Purists may feel that the exterior is rather too pink.

REAL ALE OFF LICENCE

Grosvenor Stores on Newcombe Road, Summerseat now sells Taylors bitter and Landlord and Two Shires bitter direct from the cask. There are also bottles of European beers such as EKU 28, the strongest beer in the world, and various lambic beers, Russian Stout, Thomas Hardy Ale, etc.

NEW WALKER BEERS

On October 29th Tetley-Walker transferred 25 pubs from the Tetley banner to that of Peter Walker. The new Walker pubs sell 3 real ales by handpump, Tetley bottles have been replaced by Ind Coope's and Skol has been relegated in favour of a new Wrexham lager.

The widely acclaimed Walker bitter has been retained but renamed Walker Best Bitter. The new Walker (ordinary) bitter is a low strength (og 1032.8) beer that will sell 2–3p cheaper than Tetley bitter or Walker Best Bitter. At first tasting, it seemed rather thin and lacking the subtlety of, say, Burtonwood light mild, but our investigator reserves judgement until future sampling.

The new Walker mild (og 1031) was enjoyable; this is dark with a caramely texture reminiscent of Chesters mild.

This move of Tetleys to break down their own monopolies, and in particular provide cheaper alternative beers, should be welcomed by CAMRA. Let's hope others will change if these first pubs are a success – how about one in St Helens, where the vast majority of Tetley pubs are keg?

Most of the 25 are in Merseyside, the following are in Greater Manchester: The Market, Farnworth; the Eagle & Hawk, Leigh; Victoria (real ale gain), Platt Bridge; Victoria, Skelmersdale; Park Hotel and Raven, Wigan. Warrington Ale is no longer on sale at the Raven but the Park still has its Bass.

WOODMAN TAKEOVER

Rochdale, Oldham & Bury committee stalwart Geoff Gartside and his wife Marian have taken over the tenancy of the Woodman Inn, Manchester Road, Hollinwood. The pub is in a competitive area of Oldham but Geoff's John Willie Lees takes some beating. Get down and visit them and try to persuade Geoff to get some Moonraker on the bar for the winter.

RED LION

Geoff Briggs, landlord of the Red Lion Hotel, Bury New Road (Holts), has steered his pub into the 1982 GBG. A constantly good pint over the years has brought its reward. "Briggsy" is ably helped by a drayman of Joseph Holts called Joe Jehu, whose unusual surname derives from the Old Testament: "And the driving is like the driving of Jehu the son of Nimshi; for he driveth furiously." Joe reckons driving a chariot isn't quite the same as driving a Holts dray.

BITTER SWEETENER

From 19th October Burtonwood have been holding back on price increases and have launched an advertising campaign on the theme of "Two Pints for One Pound".

The success of this venture will determine further price increases, if any. The campaign is to last until January. The Bulls Head, London Road, one of only two Burtonwood pubs in Manchester, will be reducing the price by a penny to 49p a pint.

OB NOTES

Oldham Brewery have bought two Bass fizz pubs in the Rochdale area. The Golden Ball on Spotland Road and the Joiners Arms in Middleton now sell a cheaper type of fizz!

At the other extreme, the recently revamped Westwood and Farmers Boy in Oldham now sport brand new beer engines (cask beer has always been available) and these boost the number of OB houses with new handpumps to a grand total of 3. At about the same time the nearby Westbourne lost its handpumps but retained its cask beer.

TURF TAVERN TURNABOUT

The Turf Tavern, Heaton Park, Prestwich opened as a Whitbead free house on 22nd October, selling:

Thwaites mild 50p bitter 52p; Hartleys XB 52p

Marstons Pedigree 52p; Chesters mild 49p bitter 50p

A fine array of handpumps now stand where once there were none. Not a drop
was left by Sunday night - who was it who said there was no demand for real ale?

EXCELLENT ECCLES

Peter Dawson, formerly the cellarman at the Lamb, has taken over the Royal Oak on Barton Lane. The beer has improved, the juke box has been removed from the vault and the pool table has been taken out of the best room. It all looks very promising – give the pub a try.

STRETFORD BODDIES

Boddingtons bitter is now on sale at the Old Trafford Conservative Club,
Seymour Grove (next to Throstles Nest). It has also been on sale at the Stretford
Trades and Labour Club, Chester Road, for quite some time.

OKTOBERFEST - NOT A RECORD

Despite the determined contribution of the North Manchester contingent, the 147th Oktoberfest held recently in Munich broke no records for ale consumption. The Munich newspaper, "TZ", reports that cold and wet weather reduced the number of visitors to the 16-day festival and that "only" 4.2 million litres of ale were supped. (Equivalent to 41,000 pints per hour of opening time!)



What the average Munchener lost out on the drinking he or she more than made up for on the food side. During the festival, 53 oxen were eaten (this was a record), together with 30 sides of venison, half a million chickens and 100,000 Stekkerlfische, which are cooked by smoking them on open wood fires in the festival grounds.

The slight drop in beer consumption meant that only 260 people had to be forcibly ejected from the festival for unruly behaviour, whereas 320 people (including 100 women but, this year at least, no children) were found totally paralytic and had to be carried out and left until they recovered.

As far as German honesty and efficiency are concerned, it is nice to note that the Hofbrau tent alone had 16,000 glasses stolen, of which the police have recovered a mere 330.

The organisation of the '82 Oktoberfest has already begun. The major bone of contention in newly inflation-conscious Germany will be the price of beer, set this year at DM5.25 per litre (about 70p per pint). Another potential controversy has been nipped in the bud with a statement by the city authorities confirming that all beer must continue to be served from the "good old wooden barrels."

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
