OB GOES REAL



The rumours reported in WD last month regarding Oldham Brewery's possible switch back to traditional beer have now been confirmed. Three keg only pubs have just made the change back to the real stuff. The Abbey, West Street, and the Park, Park Road, both in Oldham, and the Waterloo, Oldham Road, Ashton under Lyne, have at long last gone full circle and now offer the type of beer that they were designed to sell.

Whilst handpumps are a guarantee of real ale within OB's tied estate, it should be remembered that this rule does not apply to the free trade. Both the Diggle Hotel, Saddleworth, and Yates' Wine Lodge, Oldham, sell handpumped keg beers. So beware!

WHAT'S DOING

WIN ONE - LOSE ONE

The Farmers Arms (Whitbread), Stockport Road, Levenshulme, now sells Chesters traditional bitter. However, the Railway on the corner of Stockport Road and Albert Road in central Levenshulme no longer sells real ale. Before it was modernised Chesters real bitter was on sale.

WORDS FROM WIGAN

Sinclairs, a pay-at-the-door haunt for "New Romantics" and posers of that ilk, is selling Moorhouses Pendle Witch and bitter on handpumps. Let's hope that the real ale does better here than the short-lived Wilsons in nearby Squires.

A new pub has opened in the Wigan area - the Venture, Billinge Road, Highfield, near Wigan, serving handpumped McEwans 70/- (62p a pint) and 80/- (66p a pint).

The Anderton Arms, Ince Green Lane, Ince, has changed from Greenalls to Thwaites, like a number of pubs in the Wigan area. The Anderton, known locally as the "Long Neck", has had a pair of handpumps installed. On a sour note, the Rock Ferry in Warrington Road, Lower Ince, no longer sells IPA or Youngers No 3, though the handpumped YSB is still on sale.

BRANAGANS

Branagans Bar, an American style cellar bar, opened in The Arcade, Royal Exchange, Cross Street, in late June. The landlord is the former cellarman of nearby Corbieres and hopes to complement the handpumped Chesters bitter (60p a pint) with a high gravity beer. As well as Chesters, there is a range of bottled American beers including Schlitz, Pabst Blue Ribbon, Michelob and Millers. Connoiseurs of foreign bottled beers are recommended to try the extensive range in the neighbouring Danish Bar.

DRABS

Handpumps have replaced the electric pumps at the Park Hotel, Monton.

EAST SIDE STORIES

The latest Hyde Road pub to close its doors is Whitbread's Hyde Road Hotel near the bus garage, a one-time cask Chesters bitter outlet. It still sports a banner advertising the Heineken promotion, so a house of horrors job could be on the cards.

Amplifying two August WD items: Wilson's Devonshire in Ardwick has become the Circus, while signs outside indicate that Bass have found a buyer for the Railway opposite Ashburys station.

ON THE STATION

Robody serms to want to take about it, duence why, however

Ruddles bitter has joined the range of beers at the Station Hotel, Ashton-under-Lyne. The pub, a Good Beer Guide entry, also sells Ruddles County, Boddingtons bitter, Marstons Pedigree and Merrie Monk.

HOP IT

A recent visit to Wilsons brewery revealed that their "Original" beers are somewhat less than original. Real hops in those massive sacks called pockets are, alas, no more. Pellets and powder have taken their place. A semblance of originality is injected by dry hopping with compressed hops before the beer leaves the brewery. As good as it ever was? If Wilsons want people to swallow their beers as well as their PR guff they're going to have to do better than this.

WATCH THIS SPACE

The fourth Bury Real Ale Extravaganza is about to be unleashed on to an unsuspecting public. Dates for the diary are 11th and 12th November (Fri/Sat). Full details next month.

HEATON ALE

The adjoining Stockport districts of Heaton Chapel and Heaton Moor form a tiny haven for the real ale drinker. Five of the six outlets sell traditional beer, the exception being the Elizabethan in Heaton Mersey - Greenalls, of course. The two districts are situated at each side of Heaton Chapel railway station. The two Boddingtons outlets will be listed in the local real ale guide, but there are three newcomers. The pubs are as follows:-

Heaton Chapel House, Wellington Road North (next to Manchester Road) Chesters Bitter (handpumps)

George and Dragon, Manchester Road. Boddingtons mild and bitter (electric pumps)

Heaton Moor (All three pubs are on Heaton Moor Road)

Crown Hotel, Boddingtons mild and bitter (handpumps) Moor Top (Moor Top, Heaton Moor) Wilsons mild and bitter, handpumps. This pub is about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile along the road opposite the Savoy Cinema.

Plough, Tetleys bitter on handpump. It is also dispensed from a small, rectangular, illuminated box-type pump.

ECCLES ALE

The Town Hall Hotel, Church Street, Eccles, is selling traditional Wilsons again, after a lapse of a few years.

GREENALLS ORIGINAL

Greenalls are being very secretive about their new Original Bitter.

Nobody seems to want to talk to CAMRA about it, dunno why. However, we have learned that it will have an original gravity of 1042 and go in about 50 pubs. (The same old Special Cask/Warrington Ale story, won't these brewers ever learn?) Four outlets are expected to be the Crawford Arms, Crawford, near Skelmersdale; Black Horse, Moss Bank, St Helens; Cricketers Arms, St Helens; Old Ball, Warrington.

VINE ABOUT TURN

The Vine, Washway Road, Sale, is to become more like a pub again, barely a year after it became an official House of Horrors. The vault is to be reinstated and the whole interior is to be gutted. No wonder Whitbread beers are so expensive!

A PITY ABOUT THE OLD BLUE PIG

After spending over £31,000 on doing up Ye Olde Blue Pig public house in Audenshaw, it was hoped that real ale would be reintroduced. Not a bit of it. The excuse that was given was "something to do with the cellar". Surely 600 years ago, when the pub was built, keg had never been thought of?

WILSONS NEWS IN TAMESIDE

Handpumps have been installed in the best room of the Tontine, Penny Meadow, Ashton-under-Lyne. The Dog and Pheasant, Stalybridge, has gone over to real ale served by handpumps. The Organ, Stalybridge, is believed to be going on to handpumped traditional beers (electric pumps for bitter at present - the mild is keg).

WICKETS

The Railway Hotel, once a rather basic local opposite Garswood Station, has recently been tastefully decorated and Greenalls have installed handpumps to serve the bitter and mild. The pub is also suitable for White Shield aficionados.

PARROTING

Dukinfield's oldest pub, the Astley Arms, a Robinsons house on Crescent Road, has recently changed licensees. The most talked about feature of the Astley, the landlord's pet parrot, has gone too. The new licensee comes from the Broom House, a Bass keg-only pub in Denton.

FOR SALE

Bass have put the Bridge Inn, College Road, Rochdale, up for sale, with licence. Like the Railway, it is being offered free from tie. Tenders should be in by 16 September. Come on Drabs!



Tetley, it would seem, are keen to spend money on the pubs they haven't sold. Hot on the heels of the Bulls Head, the Foresters in Swinton has also been renovated. Pity that the etched glass window in the revamped foyer reads "FORRESTERS".

PUB OF THE MONTH

The South Manchester Pub of the Month for September is the Silver Jubilee, Hamilton Street, off Belmont Way, Stockport. The Jubilee, serving Robinsons Best Bitter and Mild, has been tenanted since May by Ron and Colette Brindley, formerly of the Unity Inn. For those who recall the quality of the beer at the Unity (Pub of the Month last December) the choice of the Jubilee will come as no surprise. Formerly the Oddfellows, the Silver Jubilee was rebuilt and renamed

in 1977 and comprises a large games room and comfortable lounge, both redecorated by the new tenants. The lounge now boasts a pianist on Fridays and Saturdays and more entertainment is planned, not least for the patio - when the enclosing wall is built.

The social side is not overlooked, with 2 pool teams, a bowling team and darts teams.

The presentation night is on Thursday, September 22nd, and a good do is assured.

PLANNING NEWS IN OLDHAM

Summit Inn, Rochdale Road, Royton - Oldham Brewery have submitted plans to refurbish and extend this tied house which currently only sells keg OB mild and bitter. A single storey extension is proposed at the rear and side to provide an enlarged drinking area and the usual food bar, with a terrace at the rear for outdoor drinking. A much enlarged ground floor cellar is proposed, so lets hope we get traditional OB mild and bitter as well as Boddingtons bitter. Another traditional OB pub in Royton would go down well with local drinkers and would increase the present count by 100%.

Woodhouse Gardens, Medlock Road, Woodhouses, Failsworth - J W Lees intend to double the size of the existing beer store at this pub, much to the delight of the landlord, Adrian Wood, who currently has to have two beer deliveries a week due to the cramped space in the cellar.

Horton Arms, Streetbridge, Chadderton - Plans are in hand to extend this Lees house into the adjoining empty cottage (the one with the black and white painted "windows") and generally refurbish the remainder of the premises to provide extended and more comfortable surroundings for beer drinking.

Houghton Arms, Oldham Road, Failsworth - Burtonwood Brewery intend to convert the adjoining empty cottage on Clinton Street at the rear of the pub into a licensed pool and darts room. An extended bar is also proposed. Perhaps the most intriguing proposal is that to convert the gents' toilet into the ladies' toilet and vice versa. The change over night could be quite interesting!


Dog and Partridge, Roundthorn Road, Oldham — the tap room at this pub is currently being enlarged by the inclusion within the building of a former passageway between the pub and the adjoining houses. Tall customers are still obliged to duck their heads on entering the room!

WHAT! NO DRABS?

The latest addition to the ever increasing number of Bolton real ale outlets (excluding Greenalls, of course) is Yates' Wine Lodge on Bradshawgate. Wilsons mild and bitter (56p and 58p) and Thwaites Best mild and bitter (56p and 58p) are available in basic traditional splendour, if somewhat spoiled by an overloud juke box.

CHEADLE CHANGES

The Railway, Manchester Road, has been modernised and Boddingtons mild and bitter on handpump (plus Oldham keg) are available along with home made food at lunchtime. The decor features many old and interesting pictures and relics from local railway history.

The Greenall Whitley 'Dirty Tricks' Department has been working overtime in changing the Greyhound, corner of Councillor Lane/Ladybridge Road, Adswood, into the 'Game Bird'.

An expensive-looking, hand-painted sign advertises 'Iraditional Ale' on sale. The lines of handpumps on the bar look equally impressive. What a pity they all go 'click' when pulled, and dispense chilled and filtered beer — an outstanding example of Greenalls blatantly conning the public.

HOLTS VALUE

The Friendship Inn (Holts), Scholes Lane, Prestwich, must be considered one of the most tastefully modernised pubs in the county. Although walls have disappeared and old tiles covered, the Friendship has been far from spoiled (Whitbread and Boddingtons take note). Prices are 50p for bitter and 48p for mild - each 1p cheaper in the vault. Good food at reasonable prices is also available.





In the wake of recent increases by several breweries it is a pleasure to report one pub which has lowered its prices. The Ostrich Hotel (Holts), Heaton Park, dropped 2p off a pint recently.

It is interesting to note that four pubs in Prestwich and Whitefield (all Holts houses) have waiter service. Is this not proof that cheap prices fill pubs?

REVAMPED COMMERCIAL

The Commercial Hotel, West Street, Oldham, has been tidied up and redecorated in keeping with the age of the pub — it dates back to around 1830. There are traditional Britannia tables and crystal chandeliers and new kitchens and toilets have been fitted.

JUMPING FOR THE REP.

Landlord Kevin Platt of the Dog & Partridge, Greenacres, Oldham, a Good Beer Guide listed pub, has joined forces with several other local daredevils to raise funds for the Oldham Coliseum (Oldham "Rep" to you). Parachuting is the name of the game and on 20th August Kevin made the Big Jump. He survived the 1,000 feet drop and he and his fellow jumpers raised £100 each in sponsorship.

WHITEFIELD HEROES

At last Whitefield has a real ale off-licence, thanks to Legendary Lancashire Heroes. It stands on Thatch Leach Lane, near Besses o'th' Barn railway station, and beers on sale are Taylors best bitter, Theakstons Old Peculier and best bitter, Ruddles County, Everards

Beacon and Tiger, Saxon Cross, Moorhouses and Pendle Witch. Also available is a choice of scrumpy and various bottled beers and lagers.
